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### **Superintendent's Note**

It's the start of another GREAT year at Grand Ledge Public Schools!

We seek to provide students the best learning environment possible. So we turned to our students, parents, community, and staff for input and ideas on how to maintain and improve our buildings. The district facilitated "focus groups" where anyone within the community could share suggestions and comments. From those we developed a survey to collect more input from the community, including those who were



unable to attend a focus group. After months of gathering input and analyzing survey data, the Board of Education recently approved placing two bond proposals on the November 6, 2018 ballot.

Bond Proposal 1 would be a .89 mill increase over the prior year's debt millage rate and would provide \$118,640,000. It would modify district facilities to facilitate restructuring the district. Elementary schools would serve students in Kindergarten through 4th grade, allowing our youngest learners to attend the same local elementary school for five consecutive years. Bond Proposal 1 would also build a new, more secure elementary school at the Wacousta location. Additionally, this proposal would designate Hayes a 5-6 intermediate school where the district could provide advanced courses. Proposal 1 would redesignate Beagle as a middle school, consistent with its original design. And because of its close proximity to the high school, 7th and 8th graders who are ready might be able to take some classes there. Finally, this bond would improve heating and cooling at the high school as well as replacing roofs and repairing parking lots across the district, as needed. Please note these are only some of the projects contained in Proposal 1.

Bond Proposal 2 would be a .55 mill increase over the prior year's debt millage rate and would provide \$29,485,000. It is focused on Community, Athletics, and the Arts. It would build a new pool at Beagle, and in the area of the current pool it would provide a new weight room and walking track, which would be open at specific times for community use. Proposal 2 would also provide improvements to the high school band and choir rooms as well as improvements to the auditorium.

To be clear, Proposals 1 and 2 are stand-alone questions, and with or without the passage of the bond propositions Grand Ledge Public Schools' millage rate is one of the lowest in the area.

### **November 6, 2018 Bond Proposals**



### On November 6, 2018, the Grand Ledge community will vote on two bond proposals.

Proposal One would provide \$118,640,000 for district-wide building and grounds improvements that would address identified and ongoing building issues and would support the district's grade restructuring initiative.

### **PROPOSAL ONE - School Improvements**



Proposal One was developed to create **SMARTER**, **STRONGER**, **SAFER** Grand Ledge Public Schools





Proposal One was developed to create **SMARTER** schools by providing modern learning environments and supporting the district grade restructuring initiative:

- Creating grades K-4 elementary schools at Holbrook, Delta Center, Wacousta, and Willow Ridge.
- Creating a grades 5-6 intermediate school at Hayes for upper elementary students and a grades 7-8 middle school at Beagle
- Adding additional classrooms to Holbrook and Beagle to support district restructuring
- Performing upgrades and renovations to create modern classrooms, including flexible furniture, LED lighting, and integrated technology
- Upgrading student and staff devices
- Providing collaboration spaces or multipurpose rooms
- Updating technology infrastructure, including classroom multimedia upgrades, to maximize connectivity, access, and learning

Proposal One was developed to create **STRONGER** schools by investing in infrastructure to support district grade restructuring:

- Funding critical upgrades to the mechanical, electrical, and plumbing systems in all schools to increase operational efficiencies
- Rebuilding Wacousta Elementary on the same site to replace the aged and inefficient facility
- Replacing systems at the end of their useful life cycles
- Upgrading high school science labs
- Replacing interior finishes as needed

Proposal One was developed to create **SAFER** schools by upgrading safety measures:

- Providing secure entrances at all K-12 school buildings and adding video surveillance
- Updating exterior lighting
- Replacing the aging school bus fleet as needed
- Improving vehicular traffic flow at drop-offs and pick-ups for pedestrian safety

### How Much Would Proposal One Increase Taxes Over The Prior Year's Rate?

If Proposal One is approved, the first year's debt millage rate is expected to increase by approximately 0.89 mills over the prior year's debt millage rate. This equals approximately an additional \$44.50 per year for each \$100,000 in market value of your home.

### What Is The District's Grade Restructuring Initiative?

If approved, the grade restructuring made possible by the bond proposal would have many positive effects.

Creating K-4th grade elementary schools would mean fewer students in buildings. Kindergartners would start at their neighborhood elementary school, likely the same one where older siblings attend, and not have to transition elsewhere after their first year.

Creating a 5th-6th grade intermediate school would provide flexibility in grouping students for instruction and afford an opportunity for broader curriculum offerings, possibly creating advanced classes along with band and choir. Students would begin to transition away from self-contained, elementary methods of instruction to more departmentalized, secondary-school methods.

Transitioning Beagle to a middle school for all 7th-8th grade students would create a secondary school campus with proximity to the high school. Both middle school and high school students could take advantage of the broader curriculum offerings and student services.



### How Does Grand Ledge Public Schools Debt Tax Rate Compare To Neighboring Districts?

If both Proposal One and Proposal Two are approved, Grand Ledge Public Schools would still have one of the lowest debt tax millage rates in the region.

### **PROPOSAL TWO**

Community, Athletics, & Fine Arts Improvements

Proposal Two would provide \$29,485,00 for athletic and fine arts building and grounds improvements designed for district and community use:

- Improving fine arts spaces at the high school by adding a main lobby and support spaces
- Constructing a new pool and support spaces
- Remodeling the old pool for alternative community and athletic uses
- Constructing a new community walking track
- Improving athletic fields and support spaces


### How Much Would Proposal Two Increase Taxes Over The Prior Year's Rate?

If Proposal Two is approved, the first year's millage rate is expected to increase by approximately 0.55 mills over the prior year's millage rate. This equals approximately an additional \$27.50 per year for each \$100,000 in market value of your home.

### **Parent Advisories**

### **Integrated Pest Management Program**

rand Ledge Public Schools has adopted an Integrated Pest Management (IPM) program. Inherent with this are the district's efforts to reduce pesticide use as much as possible. While it may be necessary, occasionally, to apply pesticide, this program does not rely on routine pesticide applications to resolve problems. Instead, we use various techniques such as habitat alteration, sanitation, mechanical means or exclusion to prevent pests from becoming a problem.

If it is necessary for the district to utilize a pesticide other than bait or gel formation at your child's school, you will receive advance notice of the application. As required by law, we will post the notice of application at your child's school entrance and in a common area located by the main office of the school. However, if you would like to be notified by first-class U.S. mail, postmarked at least three-days before the application, please contact our Operations Department at 517-925-5430. Give your name, mailing address, and what school your child attends. When school is not in regular session, parents will not receive advance notice by mail. PLEASE NOTE: In an emergency (i.e., stinging bees), pesticides may be applied without prior notice, but you will be provided notice immediately following such application.

You may review our IPM program or pesticide application records for your child's school by calling the Operations Department at 517-925-5430 or by emailing our Assistant Superintendent for Operations at johnsonm@glcomets.net.



Don't let a good drop go bad!

Not all water pollution comes from big factories – it's also caused by little household chores.

Hosing off your driveway or sidewalk sends dirt, motor oil, fertilizer, and animal waste into our rivers

and lakes – the very water we drink. So, please sweep instead of hosing. Limit your fertilizer use and avoid applying it before a rainy day. Take care when changing your motor oil. Also, tidy up after your pets.

Wondering what to do with unused household and landscaping chemicals? Drop them off for free at the Ingham County Health Department.

Remember: anything that enters storm drains or ditches is headed straight for your local lake or river. No filters, no treatment. Your waterways are closer than you think!







### West Willow Canoe/Kayak Launch Update

The development of a canoe/kayak launch along the Grand River will commence before the end of this summer. The 5 acre wooded parcel located on West Willow Highway was purchased from the Michigan Department of Natural Resources (MDNR) in 2009 with the intention of creating public recreation, and will now provide opportunities for wildlife viewing, fishing, canoeing, and kayaking. Bank stabilization work within the area of the proposed launch facility will mitigate erosion issues along the riverbank and provide an improved natural habitat. The project which was approved for \$415,700 in July, received grant funds in the amount of \$162,500 by the MDNR Trust Fund in 2016.

The design and engineering of the project is complete, and the construction will take place between the months of August to October of 2018. The construction will include a new, ADA accessible canoe/kayak launch system, an able-bodied canoe/kayak launch along the riverbank, a parking lot with handicap accessible parking, and an accessible walking path from the parking area to the launch. In the spring of 2019 the ADA accessible launch will be installed and the park site will opened for use.

This project is a continuation of Delta Township's effort to improve the amount of access that residents have to the Grand River and other natural resources. In 2017, Delta Township was awarded grant funds from the MDNR Trust Fund in the amount of \$237,500 to construct an accessible canoe/kayak launch and other park improvements at Delta Mills Park. Investments such as these are intended to increase recreational opportunities within Delta Township by creating a water trail that will connect the surrounding communities. The new launch at Delta Mills Park is slated to be constructed in 2019.


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### From the School Board President





Go Comets! We finished the 2017-18 school year in June and immediately got to work on the 2018-19 school year.

Last year the district continued to show increases in academic achievement. GLPS continues to outpace most districts for Advanced Placement scores as we saw another year of increases in standardized test score and graduated another class of future leaders. More than 1 in 4 of our 2018 seniors graduated having earned a 3 or higher on at least one AP Exam. This kind of success does not happen without everyone working together. Parents, teachers, administrators, staff and the community working together like this will ensure our

students have the opportunity to achieve their dreams.

Our extracurricular activities were, once again, outstanding. Two great musicals, many division I ratings for our choir and band students and several CAAC championships in sports including: Football, Baseball, Softball, Girls' Swimming, Girls' Cross Country, Wrestling and Boys' Lacrosse.

The district continues to be good stewards of our financial resources and ended the year with an increase to our fund balance for the fourth consecutive year. The continued fiscal responsibility allowed the board of education to authorize a 2% bonus to all GLPS employees during the 2017-2018 school year, and we hope we will do so again this year. More important, the district did not have to borrow money in order to make summer payroll for the first time in 20 years. Twenty years ago the state shifted when schools receive funding from July, when the school year begins, to October when the fiscal year begins. This allowed the state to save several million dollars in a one-time cost shift. Unfortunately, this forced most districts into a short-term loan cycle to cover summer payroll costs. As the economy continues to recover, interest rates are starting to climb. Not having to borrow to pay the summer payroll saves the district upwards of a \$100,000 in interest every year. It's been a goal of the board to increase our fund balance to ensure we never have to borrow for summer payroll again, thereby keeping dollars in the classroom where they belong.

But we're not going to rest on our laurels. The 2018-19 school year will be even better.
